There will be a presentation to discuss a current research project on the Otago Art Society's second President, William Mathew Hodgkins.

> Presentation title: And Light Still Lingers Though the Sun Be Gone

Dedicated to the promotion of art in Otago and New Zealand, William Mathew Hodgkins was an instigator of the Otago Art Society, and of New Zealand's first public art gallery. Although he is perhaps best known as the father of the distinguished expatriate artist Frances Hodgkins, W. M. Hodgkins was also a significant artist, and this discussion will celebrate the artwork of the man referred to by Frances Hodgkins as the "father of art in New Zealand".

The presentation will be given by the current Otago Art Society intern, Phoebe Thompson. Phoebe is an Art History student from the University of Otago, participating in the Humanities Internship Practicum. Phoebe will examine several artworks by W. M. Hodgkins in relation to late nineteenth century landscape painting traditions in New Zealand. 120 years later W. M. Hodgkins' artwork has gained new significance; his painting, photography, and numerous sketchbooks serve as documentation of early Otago and its people.

* And Light Still Lingers Though the Sun Be Gone is the title of a watercolour painting of the Taieri River, painted by W. M. Hodgkins towards the end of his life.

President's Report, Otago Art Society Inc. 2016-17

Presented to the Annual General Meeting, 17th August, by OAS President Nic Dempster:

I would like to begin by saying what a privilege it has been to be the President of the OAS in its 141st year and to be able to deliver an annual report to the membership. I would like to acknowledge the OAS Council who've supported me and the ideas and projects that we've come up with this past year and their help and dedication as the OAS navigates its way into a new era. An era in which we look forward to the future with vigour and enthusiasm, while retaining the nostalgia and proud history of our past.

I know that I speak for the entire OAS Council, when I say that we volunteer for our roles because of the passion, and belief we have in the Society and what it means for the wider membership and the arts community to have a strong, vibrant and diverse organisation that champions the objectives of encouraging the education of, and the participation in, the arts. I would like to express my thanks to all of them, in particular those stepping aside this year. Senior Vice President Anne Baldock (5 years), Brian Miller (3 years), and Elena Piere (1 year) have all given their time and energy to the organisation for the benefit of others. I welcome the new Council members, Brenda Nyhof, Celia Duff and Wendy Mellberg-Haecker and look forward to working with you.

Thank you to our Sales Gallery Co-ordinators Ness Kerr and Jackie Ryder for their diligence and professionalism this year. They both continue to impress with their handling of the needs of both customers and members alike. Ness, Jackie and I attended a day-long seminar on how organisations such as ours can best look after its volunteers earlier this year. We've begun to see new initiatives and tips borne out form this workshop have positive outcomes for the OAS and we look forward to building on this success.

We have given a fond farewell to our Administrator, Jeanette Bird, as she flew back to Christchurch to be closer to her children and new grandchild. Jeanette has shown impeccable accounting and administrative skills whilst handling the complexities of working for a volunteer led organisation with dignified professionalism. When Jeanette started in her role with us, the handover between administrators was not optimal, but she managed to both find her feet and make the job her own in very quick time. This is indicative of her strong work ethic and desire to do the best job she can. Jeanette has improved many of our internal administrative systems and assisted with helping the OAS Council as it navigates itself through several governance and procedural changes. We wish her all the very best of luck for the new chapter in her life, and thank her for the four and a half years of service she has given to the Society.

We warmly welcome Jen Long, our new Administrator into the fold. I know that the Society as a whole will be supportive and looking forward to seeing her spread her wings in what is a very challenging role within our organisation, and help her with facing the adventures that await in the years to come.

Our placement within the Dunedin Railway Station is made possible with the assistance of the **Dunedin City Council**. Our Service Level Agreement is now called a Property Agreement Grant (PAG), but still provides the same part lease subsidy that we rely on to continue operating in this historic building. The rental rate will remain the same up until Nov 2018, when we can possibly expect an increase. Any change will be negotiated between the DCC and the OAS Council. Any increase in the rent will be gratefully matched by the PAG contribution from the DCC, but this may place more strain on our finances moving forward. We continue to receive our rates relief from the DCC also and thank them for their continued support.

We welcomed **JW Smeaton Accountants** and **Alan Dove Photography** who sponsored the Summer Exhibition and Youth Art Awards respectively. We also continued our partnership with **Anderson Lloyd**, the **Rowcroft Family** and **John Pledger** who continued their sponsorship of the Spring and Annual Exhibitions.

Thank you to our friends and sponsors at **Hope and Sons** and **Edinburgh Realty** for their continued support of the arts and the OAS. Their events have become important fixtures of the arts calendar for artists up and down the South Island.

Along with Anderson Lloyd and Hope and Sons, I must thank Andrew Cook from **Art Zone** and the **Otago Daily Times** for their kind sponsorship for naming rights of each of our four galleries. Thank you also to our other Corporate Members Karen and Stewart MacLeod, **MacLeod & Associates** and the **Margaret Freeman Gallery**.

This year saw the inaugural Cleveland National Art Awards. A real celebration of art from around the country in a variety of mediums. Not only have these awards assisted the OAS financially, but it has also brought back a very popular event, albeit in a new incarnation, for the benefit of all artists. This was the culmination of two years of hard work from the OAS Council and we were delighted to work with the **Cleveland Charitable Foundation**, **Williams Signs and Graphix** and **Gallery De Novo** who all contributed to the prize pool. We look forward to entering discussions with these organisations in the future for 2019.

The OAS received a grant from the **Otago Community Trust** (\$1000.00) for the partial cost of the new lighting units which now run through the three smaller Anderson Lloyd, Art Zone and ODT galleries as well as the Hope Gallery. We also received a grant from the **Shacklock Trust** (\$500) this year which has gone towards the cost of a new projector.

We had private hire exhibitions from the Otago Embroiders Guild, NOTUS, OAS Member Wayne Patrick's Solo Show and Frances Hodgkins – The Hidden Portfolio (which travelled down from Auckland and gave us some unexpected media coverage). We also ran an exhibition that linked in with **iD Fashion Week**. 'Off the Rack' proved popular with the exhibiting artists, visitors and guests of the Fashion Show Preview evenings. Thank you to iD's Events Manager Trudi Munroe for all her assistance as well as Lindsay Campbell and the team from **Alex Campbell's Menswear** who supplied us with clothes hangers and mannequins. We also turned our 'Demo Day' into a 'Demo Weekend.' Even with this event held in July, we had an amazing amount of visitors through the doors and already have plans for perhaps two demo weekends for 2017-18.

Evening Life Drawing classes run by Louisa Baillie began in the Spring of last year and continued on in the Summer. We hope that we are able to bring you more of these classes later in the year. Julia McNaughton's work with the 'Think Ink' print making group continues to be an asset for the Society and makes great use of our printing press.

Additions to the Permanent Collection through kind donations by the families and friends of the artists as well as Visitor's to the OAS wanting to donate from their own collections. New works on display including but are not limited to H V Miller, John L McIndoe, Myra Kirkpatrick, and Jackie Bateman. Thank you to Geoff Adams for his diligence and expertise in this area of the Society.

The OAS continues to reach out to other arts organisations including the ODFAS, DPAGS, DSA, Caselberg Trust, Southland Art Society (and others), in an attempt to work more closely together on our shared goals. We now highlight many of their activities in our monthly newsletter and our Facebook page, while also including their membership forms in our New OAS Member Induction Packs. We are endeavouring to encourage DSA Students to take up short term internships to assist with our larger exhibitions.

We welcome Phoebe Thompson as our first Intern from the **University of Otago**. She joins us from the Art History Dept and will be researching our Past President, William M Hodgkins. This will be the first in what we hope will become regular appointments to help us produce accessible histories leading up to our 150th Anniversary in 2026. At the end of her 13 - week internship she will hold a seminar at our Nov Member's Meeting on her research project.

Our new advertising regime has started to produce good results for the Society and I hope that we can continue along this trend of targeted and consistent messaging and branding. Thank you to Reid Baldock for all his hard work designing our posters and print media to a very high and professional standard.

I devote my time and energy to the OAS because I believe in its goals of promoting participation and education in the arts. By being an open and inviting environment for artists (and art lovers) of all stripes, we not only achieve these goals, but we also enliven our membership, diversify our exhibitions, and increase our volunteer base. We all have a role to play in this regard. I am a strong believer that you only get out, what you put in. Don't expect more until you do more. 
