



# President's Message

### **Doug Hart**

### Membership

At the very important meeting held on Thursday 18th October, a resolution was passed by a 90% majority to end the two-tier system of membership. It will give all members the opportunity to submit their work in any of our Exhibitions without going through the artist selection process. This will be a step forward for the Society to implement the ideals of the DCC's Ara Toi arts and culture strategy for Dunedin, of which inclusivity is a cornerstone.\* It means that members who would in the past be wary of applying for artist's membership can now submit an artwork in subsequent shows.

Many famous artists (as we know them now) did not have it as easy as we think. They struggled too, and more likely than not, a lot more than any of us ever will need to. However, they managed to look past the rejections and the criticism, focusing on their art alone because they believed in themselves. People like Andy Warhol, J.M.W. Turner, Monet, Cezanne and Picasso in their formative years – not to mention Colin McCahon who was turned down by the OAS. In more recent times, other artists have not gained selection but have gone on to be award winners elsewhere.

Submitted artworks will still be subject to placement by decision of the judge or judges involved in the selection process of the exhibition.

\* According to survey feedback, a misperception exists that the DCC has an influence on how our Society is run. The OAS willingly embraces the DCC's arts and culture strategy as part of the city's creative community.



Fifty members attended the Special Meeting to vote on the proposed membership change. After the votes were counted, vice president Annie Pepers announced the result to waiting members and President Doug Hart. Forty-five votes were in favour of the change, five voted to retain the status quo.

#### Shop

Our shop is very ably managed by Ness and Jackie and the artworks are carefully chosen and displayed to show the best that local artists can aspire to. Tourists and locals alike are very impressed by the choice and are looking for objects made locally and not imported from abroad as so many 'gifts' are these days. Tourists like to be able to take away a souvenir of the region but are not always able to transport large items such as paintings, even though we can courier them at an extra cost. If you are lucky enough to have work in the shop then the emphasis could be on smaller, lighter items that can be put into suitcases.

The road works in the city, and particularly around the Railway Station, have had the inevitable effect of reduced footfall and therefore reduced sales. Tourists and locals find it very frustrating that they can't park at or near the station. I trust this will remedy itself shortly.

### **Potential Painting Group**

I would like to float an idea in order to harvest your reactions to setting up an art group in the Hope Gallery. The enterprise would be relatively simple to operate, would not entail any money and should be stimulating for the group to share ideas and 'expertise' from fellow artists. It would take place on a Thursday between 10.30am and 3pm for a maximum of approximately 10 to 12 members. Tables and ground sheets would be put in the Hope Gallery and the members would enjoy the friendship, chatter and support within the group. People would work independently, but If they needed advice then fellow artists would be more than happy to supply it. You could bring your lunch. The group may wish to supply tea, coffee and milk and this would be budgeted by them. The Society would not be involved with this expense. I've always thought that visitors love to see artists working and consequently if you don't mind people looking over your shoulder at times then this would be for you. You might even get a commission, but what this enterprise does is provide a few hours when you can be very focused on your work and to be a very social event. It's hoped that if members are interested then we could set it up to run from January. It would be on a first come, first served basis and then a waiting list. ### **Ceramics and art**

The combined exhibition with CANZ potters' group will be open from the week after the Spring Exhibition takedown. The CANZ entries are being judged, but our members' work is not. We hope that our creative artists can come up with artwork that has some theme pertaining to pottery, clay, kilns etc. I've got mine ready and so has Annie Pepers, my very hardworking Vice President whose work appears on the exhibition poster.

### The Very Affordable Art Exhibition

Following swiftly on from this is the exhibition where work is on sale at \$800 or less. It's hoped that by lowering the ceiling price it will attract a more diverse buying public into purchasing art, potentially for the first time. I've always thought that everyone should have a piece of original work at home, no matter how inexpensive. There is a wealth of creativity among our members. Entries are limited to two and if yours sells, then we will replace it.

### Fringe Festival 2019

Next year's Fringe Festival will be all about the nude. Get your thinking caps on because it doesn't have to be naked people. The human form can be explored in many different ways and in many different mediums. Likewise thinking outside the box to portrayal of nude buildings, cows, chickens or boats. How about painting in the style of Picasso, surrealism, pointillism or pop art of the 60's? It should be an exhibition that will bring people into the galleries who are tempted and fascinated by the very title. Donations from the exhibition will go to the bowel cancer charity and we hope that that is as substantial as last year's donation to the guide dogs for the blind. What artwork can you think of in the next few months?

### Finally

I wish you all well for the Spring with vibrant tree leaves and gorgeous plumes of blossom. I shall be soaking up the cultural heritage and beauty of Vietnam, Cambodia and Laos throughout November and hoping to gain much inspiration for new works.


