President's Message

Doug Hart

Welcome to another month and what a month it's been for the OAS. The Nude exhibition has certainly grabbed the headlines of the Dunedin art community and meant that we've had many thousands of curious people coming to view the wide range of contemporary, classic and quirky interpretations of the nude. When we first mentioned the concept, we wanted people to think outside the box as well as interpret the body in the artist's original style. Well we've certainly hit that brief in an interesting and thought provoking way. Thanks to all the people who contributed including Steve Peyroux, Ewan Macgregor, Geoff Williams and Angela Burns, to name but a few.

Bowel Cancer Charity

The Nude exhibition was designed to not only showcase artworks but also to raise money for this important charity. I am so grateful for the moving talk that Natalie gave, who at the age of 26 was diagnosed with bowel cancer and had a fifteen month old baby to look after. In addition, I'd like to thank the screening team, Gen and Laura who gave an insight to the recognition of symptoms and care procedures. Buy an artwork, save a life.

Parking issues

This is still an issue for us because without car spaces at the front of the building, it will prove very difficult for members to pick up and drop off work. After all it's a working Railway Station still! I have started a petition to hand into the DCC regarding this. If you haven't signed then please come into the shop. The OAS has no objection to the removal of buses, coaches and camper vans to nearby designated areas, but keeping car access is crucial.

Art and conflict

The terrible shootings in Christchurch on 15th March made me consider the role that art plays in the combatting of extremist outrages that have plagued our societies throughout the globe. I can think of many examples that portray suffering in the hope that people will stand up to war and bigotry. Picasso's *Guernica* shows the tragedies of war and the suffering it inflicts upon individuals, particularly innocent civilians. The callous bombing raids inflicted by the Nazi regime were unbelievably evil. This work has gained a monumental status, becoming a perpetual reminder of the tragedies of war, an anti-war symbol, and an embodiment of peace.

Art is used to oppose conflict. Anti war organisations have commissioned artists to undermine sympathy for wars and produce material support for organisations such as Amnesty International and Medicins Sans Frontier. Many artists have also produced art independently to campaign for peace, notably Otto Dix after experiencing the horrors of WW1 and his condemnation of the rise of the Nazi regime which targeted minorities within society.

Conversely, art has also been used in the propaganda and glory of war and having recently visited the temple complexes of Angkor Watt, exquisitely crafted carvings of conflict, slavery, mutilations and victory adorn the walls.

In other works, such as in North Korea and Stalinist Russia, the artists have depicted the opposing side as aggressive, powerful, and savage in order to stimulate animosity and fear for the opposing side. To evoke a sense of nationalism and pride among compatriots, they have depicted battlefield victories, and to stress the need for continued public support.

We can only hope that mankind's lack of empathy for others eventually assumes the same status as the extinction of the dinosaurs.

Cleveland Exhibition

This is well underway at the moment and will be a monumental task for the judges to select and ultimately award the prizes. This is the first time we have a digital entry system along with the majority of major award exhibitions. It eliminates the practice of sending actual paintings in and then having them returned after deselection. The only downside of this method is you cannot effectively see the textures and true colours. The prize money is even greater this year and Margaret Cleveland is really looking forward to it. Thanks again to fellow sponsors, Moray Gallery, Gallery de Novo and Taut Art.

RALPH MILLER EXHIBITION


15th – 26th April in the Ryman Health Care Gallery, OAS.

Ralph Miller was the most prolific artist in the Pacific during WW2 and is noted for his drawings around the streets of Dunedin. He died in 1956 aged 37, leaving over 1000 sketches and drawings. He would have been 100 this year, so his son Brian Miller and family have sponsored an exhibition to celebrate his work and show a range of originals and working drawings.
