President's Annual Report 2018–19

I PERSONALLY FEEL PRIVILEGED to be involved with the oldest art society in New Zealand, particularly as I've only been a resident in this wonderful country for five years. With the sudden resignation of the previous president, Nic Dempster, who admirably led the organisation into new fields, I was thrust into the society with little experience. However, with a superb team of councillors to support me, in particular Vice President Annie Peppers, the running of the organisation became easier. All sixteen council members have given up time and energy to set up and run the exhibitions and day-to-day initiatives of the society.

During the year we have said farewell to Cassandra Rolston and welcomed Danielle Munro and Lindsay Campbell onto the council. Their contribution is much valued and expertise in certain areas such as business acumen, appreciated.

Staff changes and challenges

This year has flown by and has involved a lot of changes and challenges in the administration of the OAS. In the office, Cynthia Haarkman stood down after a sterling effort involved in data input, and was replaced by Anja Waugh. Then in January, Jen Long was signed off by her doctor on medical grounds. Fortunately, Anja stepped into the role to try and keep the office procedures going. It was at this time that we had problems with the alarms, internet and phone systems because of the changeover from copper cable to fibre optics. I am very grateful to Anne and Tony Baldock who gave up so much time to sorting out this and installing new efficient accounting systems to streamline the slightly antiquarian programs. I'd also like to acknowledge the funding award from the Otago Community Trust that enabled us to implement new office and health and safety initiatives.

Anja was head-hunted by a local software company, making the most of her degree in a plum job, which left us looking for a replacement with the necessary skill set to run the office. We found such a person in Ngaire Kitt who had previously worked for Greenpeace and Frank Gehery architects in Los Angeles before returning to Dunedin and working in office administration. Ngaire has quickly got to grips with this complex job and her lovely personality and work ethic is paying dividends for us. It's very beneficial that she is in the office five days a week dealing with day-to-day issues on behalf of our members. She is also an accomplished artist.

The shop has also been the subject of change with the loss of Jackie Ryder, who is concentrating on her artistic business. Thanks go to Jackie who spent four valuable years running the shop with the amazingly knowledgeable Ness Kerr. Jackie's replacement is Jan Ingram who has had a lot of previous experience with the OAS and is also an accomplished artist.

Funding and donations of supplies

I am very grateful to the DCC for leasing us this gallery and in partly funding our continued occupancy of the building. It's one of the most iconic and photographed buildings in New Zealand and it's good that the society has breathed new life into the structure. The thousands of visitors, both international and New Zealand public, always comment on the high standard of artworks displayed imaginatively within the galleries. This year we had a donation of paint from Mitre Ten to freshen up some feature walls in the

four galleries and the shop. Again we had very positive comments.

I would like to thank Southern Cross Lighting for the donation of new LED lighting which enhances the display of our exhibitions.

The building is presently undergoing upgrades in a new fire warning system, parking issues and signage.

Parking

Parking availability is a very important issue for us and the other tenants of the building. We raised the point that all our members and exhibitors need easy access to parking close to the building, owing to the size and weight of artworks to be delivered and collected. It is strongly felt that work could be damaged if the exhibitors have to walk a long distance from their parked vehicle, with bulky work in all potential weathers. The OAS has no objections to banning buses and coaches in front of the station as this impinges on the look of the building and impairs photographing this structure. Also, we have no objection to the partial pedestrianisation of the frontage to stop traffic using it as a rat run. It is hoped that we, as an important organisation, will have specific parking allocated to us allowing our members to safely access the building.

Signage

There has also been discussion regarding signage of all the tenants in the station, both external and internal. I believe that as a classic heritage building there should be tasteful and informative signage that also advertises that a prominent gallery and shop are within the building. As a charity we are reliant on establishing a good trade with the public in order to pay our way. This will be an ongoing project with the cooperation of the DCC and Heritage New Zealand in order to strike the right balance.

OAS Constitution

Thanks go to Sharon Stark Lont our new pro bono lawyer who has rewritten a section of the constitution regarding the disbanding of artist only membership. It has been felt for many years that the artist only membership was an elitist item in view of the DCC Ara Toi Strategy which states inclusiveness. We wanted all our members to have the opportunity to exhibit their work, with the independent exhibition judges having the final say on the quality of the work. The voting for this new initiative was overwhelmingly in favour and has resulted in ordinary members receiving awards in our recent shows.

Sponsorship support

In addition we are very grateful to the continued sponsorship and support of J.W.Smeaton Accountants, the Rowcroft family, John Pledger, Alan Dove Photography and Rymans Healthcare. Other notable benefactors are Gallery de Novo, Moray Gallery, Taut Art, Otago Daily Times, Hope and Sons and Artzone.

Featured artists

Our featured artists were a real success with the general public, and alongside the demonstration artist weekend proved that it's so important to show the processes that artists go through to achieve a finished piece. This year's cost to the featured artist will be halved in order for them to make it more commercially viable.

Nude Exhibition: donation to charity

One challenging exhibition this year was the Nude Exhibition as part of the Fringe Festival. The response was excellent with four full galleries featuring anything from a stripped down car to a full sized unadorned 3D model. We raised \$750 for the bowel cancer charity as well as highlighting the illness through nursing, sufferer and charity speakers regarding the prevalence of this disease in New Zealand.

Non-OAS exhibitions

Another successful exhibition was the National Ceramic show and I'm grateful to Nicole Kolig for helping to organise this event. They will be returning next year with another exhibition, along with the National Pastel Association of New Zealand. There's also the opportunity to host an International Exhibition regarding Solander, the Swedish explorer, featuring artworks from famed New Zealand artists. I met with the Swedish Ambassador a few months ago who was very impressed with our galleries, artwork and variety of events.

Members' Night and painting group

Every third Thursday of the month is the Members' Night and we have had a variety of speakers presenting subjects on a wide variety of art related topics. It's an opportunity to get to meet other members and to be more involved with the organisation. These talks take a long time to prepare and

it would be nice to increase the involvement this coming year. With this in mind, we inform other art organisations to join us, such as the DPAG and ODFAS. In addition, there is an informal painting group on a Thursday from 10.30 to about 3.00pm. Bring along your work, sandwiches etc. and just have a sociable time. You get to meet many people visiting the galleries from all over the world. The feedback I've had is that they love to see artists working because in most galleries this doesn't occur.

Promotion and advertising

We promote the Society increasingly through our website and social media. Thanks go to Reid Baldock, Brian Miller and Raimo Kuparinen for updating these channels of communication. However, poster advertising, leaflet drops and newspaper reporting are very effective avenues. I'd like to acknowledge the support and exposure given by Brenda Harwood of *The Star* and Rebecca Fox of the *ODT*.

Crucial role of volunteers

Finally, the parts played by our volunteers (including myself) are vital to the running of the society. I value every minute that they devote to aspects of the job from shop work, catering, hanging exhibitions to being a councillor and painting gallery walls. You are the sum of what you put in and that sum adds up to a huge amount. Let's embrace the new society year and look forward to exciting opportunities.

In Memoriam: Audrey Bascand

It is with deep sadness that we learned of Audrey Bascand's death, July 24, at Woburn Enliven Home in Lower Hutt. Audrey had a long association with the OAS, both as an artist and a council member, and witnessed at first hand the society's move in 1969 to its first home, the old Northern Post Office, now the H.D. Skinner Annexe of the Otago Museum. During the presidencies of Shona McFarlane and Fred O'Neill, she helped with the transformation of the building from Post Office to gallery. They were exciting years. Later, in 2015, she was elected as a Vice Patron, and remained fully involved and interested in our activities until her death.

As an artist Audrey was wonderfully accomplished and inventive. Her work has featured in a number of galleries, including galleries in Dunedin, and beyond, such as the Canterbury Society of Arts, The New Zealand Academy of Arts as well as the Hocken Collections, The Auckland Art Gallery also contains her files. Her works include prints, etchings, engravings, and watercolours. There is a work of hers in our Permanent Collection entitled "Same Hills" which shows her fascination with different techniques – solar print from an original engraving of 1863 Dunedin with an etching in zinc applied by the Chine Collé method. It won a prize in a Hope's Exhibition and was gifted to the society in 2003.

Audrey was also a widely respected teacher. Her classes were marked by her genuine interest in the achievements of her students. She would spend time assessing not only their progress, but also exploring with them their techniques, their choice of colour and even the different brands of paints and their potential.

She advised, and she also listened.

Those who knew Audrey will miss her, not simply for her friendship and knowledge, but also for the best qualities of the society she represented, its persistent pursuit of that elusive question as to the nature of art.

We all extend our sympathy and condolences to her family.

Life is short, art is long, often quoted as '*Ars longa, vita brevis*', after Seneca's rendering in *De Brevitae Vitae* sect.
