The exhibition's theme is 'Making Connections'. It will be interesting to see how our artists have interpreted this in various mediums.



OAS offers members opportunity to book gallery space at a reduced rate for a week, to exhibit and be an on-site 'working artist' demonstrating your techniques. This is an excellent way to engage with the public, hopefully to sell items of exhibited work, and perhaps gain a commission for a future artwork. Several previous artists have already booked to be a Featured Artist, but some spaces are still available. Contact the office to check availability.



Presentation for Exhibitions

It seems to be a fact of life that filling in forms and following instructions confuses people. This may be because the information itself is confusing, or the person is not paying attention or is in a rush. When we at OAS organise an exhibition we try our hardest to explain the requirements, but still so many entries turn up with problems that show a lack of attention to detail.

- Please read all points on entry forms and follow the instructions. (Do not assume that every exhibition has the same requirements.)
- For hanging, it is essential to have D-rings on the back of your artwork because of our hanging system. (Please ensure the D-rings are large enough to carry the weight of your artwork.)
- Labelling identification of your work is essential, both on a swing tag and on the item itself, in case the swing tag falls off.
