Judge's Comments: My Happy Place is a subjective concept. For me, these times of isolation have made me appreciate the missed contact with friends and whanau there and is consolation in just being in each other's company. There is an element of control in this work with its smooth. even background yet this is juxtaposed with an

energy of expressive brushwork, runs of watery medium and delicate, gestural contour lines. Two figures quietly reading their books, are lost in their own thoughts and I am with them, sharing this moment. I feel transported into this happy place.

Judge's Comments: As the bold frame of this small painting draws me in, I am enticed by the subdued, warm colour palette and loose brush marks. The work






September Members' Meeting

The Members' meeting took a different turn in September as we met at Toitu rather than in the Railway Station where the meeting is usually held each third Thursday evening of the month. This was as a consequence of our usual venue being closed as a result of the anticipated restoration work being done on the building. The meeting was arranged in conjunction with one of the curators at Toitu, Peter Read, who was asked to show our members as well as Toitu members and interested members of the public, some of the early pictures in the collection, which were of the early pioneers to our city and the houses and areas that they settled.

Doug Hart gave a most interesting introduction explaining his growing interest in the history and development of Dunedin and the importance of preserving our cultural inheritance, which set the scene for Peter's presentation. Doug was inspired by his developing interest to paint two pictures of early times in Macandrew Bay and in Port Chalmers.



The pictures shown by Peter were from the earliest paintings from the 1840s through to about the late 1850s, all before the Gold Rush. Peter used the portraits from the Early Settlers Gallery to introduce several of first arrivals of Europeans into Otago Harbour and then went on to show what Dunedin looked like at the time they arrived and some of the houses that they built for themselves and their families. Some of the early families are well known names to present Dunedinites such as Valpy, Mackenzie, Kettle to name just a few. Many of the large families had children who painted the natural environment that they saw around the Otago Harbour, such as the tree clad hills of the peninsula and the Toitu Stream where it entered the swamp that is Princes Street today. The pictures are invaluable as this is our only record of this period of time. Photography only started in the later 1850s and showed similar scenes to those in the early paintings.

The audience felt that they had had a wonderful opportunity to have a glimpse into the lives and scenery of the very early days of Europeans' pioneer lives, and the hardships that they must have faced to even get a small foothold on the land. Thanks to the Maori in the area at the time they were treated with kindness and assistance, during their attempts to survive their first few years in Early Dunedin.

The pictures on the big screen that we saw are all from the originals that are preserved in the Toitu stack. This is available to view by appointment. It was suggested that a group might get together to have a visit in the near future. - Tash Hurst
