We were inundated with submissions for these awards – over 300 in total! After a lengthy and difficult selection process by the judge, Graham Fletcher, Jenny Longstaff as curator, ably assisted by some hanging helpers, managed to display 174 artworks for the final, interesting and varied exhibition.

Graham then returned to pick the winners which were presented at a lively awards evening on Friday 4th August. Prior to this, two corporate nights were held which generated significant sales, testament to how well received the quality of work was in the exhibition. Very many congratulations to the prize winners, who are shown on pages 2 and 3. Many thanks to Edinburgh Realty, Graham, as well as the OAS Councillors and volunteers who made this possible. And to Rose and her team for the excellent food at the awards' presentation night!

Do come in and have a careful look, and then remember to vote for the People's Choice Award.

If you were excluded from the Edinburgh Awards because of the type of art you do, or you were not selected this time, there are more opportunities to enter exhibitions this year. The Ryman Spring Exhibition, theme 'I Remember When', is on from 18th September – 21st October. This is followed by some private-hire exhibitions and then we have the exciting Book Project and OAS Book-themed exhibition starting in November. Many more details to come.



2023 Edinburgh Premier Art Awards Results

Judge's comments by Graham Fletcher

1st Prize:

Caroline Kelly: "Resonate"

A beautifully crafted painting that creates a conscious parallel with traditional portraiture. This captivating artwork exudes a gentle yet powerful warmth where the connection between artist and model shines through. It celebrates the endurance of portraiture and reflects on what could be considered the most engaging subject of all: the human face. This piece provides a timeless contemplation of the human experience.

2nd Prize:

Jonas Jessen Hansen: "Blomst" (pictured at far left)

This artwork skilfully blends elements from the genres of still-life, Pop art, and pointillism, resulting in a mesmerising visual experience. What initially captured my attention was the innovative use of watercolour and acrylic on a felt substrate, and how the imagery is enigmatic and ambiguous, leaving viewers pondering the nature of the subject, its mysterious location, and the intriguing presence of what appears to be an unusual shadow.



3rd Prize: Gavin Chai:

"Trees, Birds, Bunnies, Bees"

A painting in the plein-air tradition that is content-rich and forms a dialogue with art history with nods to Velázquez's "Las Meninas", Manet's "Luncheon on the Grass", as well as drawing inspiration from the Impressionists' vision of nature in an idyllic state. The canvas breathes with an enchanting sense of harmony and serenity where we are invited to engage as an active participant through the interplay of sunlight, foliage, and fauna.





Merit 1: Jay Hutchinson: "Monster"

On first impression, the work reads as humorous and pushes the boundaries of painting within a staged frame. However, beyond its initial light-hearted appearance, lies a compelling subtext that delves into the profound impact of consumerism and materialism on our contemporary society, permeating even the minutest aspects of our daily lives.



The number of entries received for this year's Edinburgh Awards became a logistical challenge. With so many large works entered, handling all the packages that arrived required many hours of volunteer work. Here, Ann Jacobson decides which item to unwrap. When the exhibition finishes we will be needing help to repackage sold and returned works. Can you spare some time to assist?

Merit 2: Gemma Baldock: "Riot"

This is a complex collage work bringing together a diverse cast of characters in various emotional states to fill the picture plane. The eye wanders from one interaction to another in trying to comprehend the situation, but we the viewer have come partway through the riot not knowing what started it and how it will end. It is a colourful and chaotic spectacle and asks of us to fill the missing gaps in constructing our own narrative.







Special Mention: Danielle Munro: "Kotuku Dreams"

A small and delicate work that showcases the kotuku (white heron) that flock mysteriously around the central figure. It operates at the nexus of a dream and the waking world, seamlessly blending both realms in perfect harmony.

Danielle Yealands: "Remembrance Series No 7"

A masterful work characterised by a rich palette of colour and bold brushstrokes, resulting in a beautifully textured surface that seamlessly integrates all these artistic elements.

Special Mention: Potor Mol aron: "Leaving

Peter McLaren: "Leaving St Kilda II"


The innovative use of a lightbox caught my attention with this piece. Few things evoke the essence of St Kilda as profoundly as its iconic beach and the captivating ocean waves. This artwork skilfully encapsulates the dynamic and turbulent nature of the sea, serving as a powerful reminder that, in the end, Nature prevails.



Special Mention: Sharnae Beardsley: "Adaptation 13"

A single orchid in bold colours hangs there unwavering within a field of grey. Its delicate graphic style adeptly transforms the three-dimensional world into a nearflat representation, employing a simple yet effective use of colour and line with minimal embellishments.

Winner of the Edinburgh Prize, chosen from the exhibition entries by the Edinburgh Realty team, independent of the judge. Congratulations to Sarah Freiburger for her painting, Motatapu River, Wanaka.
