President's Message

SPRING IS HERE and the promise of longer, lighter, warmer days will hopefully inspire us to get out and about to experience this beautiful country. The range of wildlife, vistas, buildings and sunsets should give us ideas for future artworks. Remember, the **Spring Art** awards sponsored by **Ryman Healthcare** will be here very soon [receiving day: *Sunday 13 October*]. We are looking forward to seeing the range of subjects covered by our members. You might also have work that you want to display in our **'love, buy, take' affordable art show** that runs through December and January.

Youth Art Awards

We had over 300 entries this year from individuals and schools. The range of artworks, from gasworks to angry cats and umbrellas to multiple headed models, has filled two galleries with light, colour and inspiration. Teachers and parents have encouraged their children to enter this annual award exhibition and we are all delighted by the results on the gallery walls and on plinths. We wish to thank **Pauline Bellamy from Bellamy's Gallery and Sarah Cunningham from the Portobello Hotel and Bistro** for sponsorship of this show.

We hope that the children continue to develop their skills and creativity over the years to become the designers and artists of the future securing the reputation of New Zealand as a beacon of cutting edge technology and fine art projects.

Which brings me nicely to the subject of young artists, and in particular the life of **David Hockney**. I've just had the pleasure of reading his biography and there are many interesting anecdotes regarding his passion for art. As soon as he could hold a pencil, he was always making marks on any surface he could find. This, I know, is a very familiar story to parents who sometimes see the results of their child's creativity scrawled haphazardly in felt tip pen or lipstick across many surfaces in their houses. However, by the age of five Hockney was drawing cartoons on the edges of newspapers, comics and any other paper he could find. The only paper he was banned from using was in books and on the wallpaper. He even used chalk to draw on the linoleum floor in the kitchen.

Hockney was one of five children living in a terraced house in Bradford. He shared a bedroom with his brother John and proceeded to splatter paint on most surfaces, especially if he inadvertently left a tube of paint under some newspapers to be trodden on. The family had very little money and by the time Hockney went to Bradford Grammar School, he had to think up ways to earn money to buy paints for his passion. He worked as an usher in the local theatre and took on dares to earn money. These dares included jumping in the canal and balancing along a bridge parapet before eventually falling into another canal.

Whilst at art school in Bradford, he would take jobs in a variety of establishments just to earn enough money to indulge his passion for painting. He admired Stanley Spencer and copied the way Spencer trundled a pram filled with easel and paints to destinations around Bradford to sketch local scenes. Hockney, like Spencer, became a familiar figure around town.

Hockney had exceptional talent which was recognised by his parents who valued education and the need to succeed in life. His father Kenneth was a conscientious objector

during the war, and post-war a peace activist and staunch communist. Hockney acquired many of his father's values, including declaring he was a conscientious objector to avoid doing military National Service; instead he served his National Service working as a medical orderly in Bradford hospital for skin diseases. He painted signs for ban the bomb demonstrations, and protested against inequality.

Always observing, always painting, and winning local awards secured him a place at the Royal College of Art in London. Here he saved money by living in a garden shed at the bottom of an actor's garden and having a three-weekly bath at the college. The drive to better himself at art was the focus for everything he did. The rest of his career is of course well documented – he is the world's highest paid living artist.

Cruise Ship Season

I've noticed the city recently becoming busier with tourists. Very shortly the cruise ships will be returning, bringing with them a percentage of people who are interested in art and wish to buy souvenirs from Dunedin and the Otago region. Being in the iconic Railway Station, our society benefits hugely from this influx of visitors. It is hoped that the ban on coaches parking directly outside will not have a negative effect on our footfall. The shop, which is run by the wonderful Ness and Jan plus our dedicated volunteers, holds a variety of pictures and smaller items that tourists can purchase and take away on their travels. Our bread and butter income through the year comes from visitors buying locally crafted artwork from our shop. I've spoken to many travellers and they really appreciate the fact that these paintings, prints and crafts are New Zealand-made.

We would like more members to make a commitment to volunteer in the shop, if possible, and give back to the society that supports our artists.

Finally, 2020 is nearly fully booked out with just a few time slots left for individuals who wish to hire a gallery.

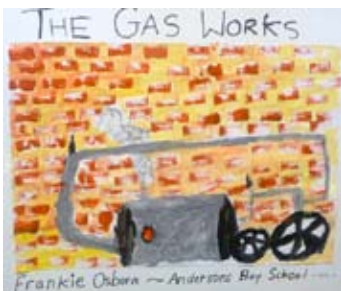
